The 11 February ceasefire brought hope, allowing children to go back to school in the aftermath of conflicts and helping them recover a sense of normalcy.	
UNICEF calls upon all parties throughout the country to ensure the right to quality education for every child. "Depriving children from this right is detrimental to their well-being and to their country's future."
