FOREWORD

The Safe Schools Financing Plan is the outcome of rigorous consultative engagements with relevant stakeholders at both the national and sub-national levels of government in Nigeria. I wish to acknowledge the commitment and technical inputs of the Federal Ministry of Education, Nigeria Police Force (NPF), Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC), Department of State Services (DSS) and Defence Headquarters (DHQ). I am also extremely grateful to the various Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs), States, development partners, donor agencies, civil society organisations, enumerators and reviewers who submitted documents, participated in the verification exercise, reviewed relevant documents, and attended the validation workshop.

The Plan is a national investment response aimed at protecting 'At-risk' schools, learners, teachers, and non-teaching staff from attack in Nigeria. It will be implemented over four years (2023 - 2026), with a total investment of N144.77b commencing from 2023. The Plan proposes N32.59b in 2023; N36.99b in 2024; N37.16b and N38b in 2025 and 2026 respectively. The Federal Government of Nigeria has therefore made a provision of N15b in the 2023 budget. This means that there is a funding gap of N12.7b for States, private sector and development partners that may wish to support Nigeria in keeping our



schools safe from threats and attacks.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to the dedicated team at the Federal Ministry of Finance, Budget and National Planning who worked tirelessly to ensure that we fulfil our commitment to safe schools. It is my sincere hope that all key MDAs and States will swiftly facilitate implementation at various levels for safe learning communities. I also encourage development partners and civil society organisations to hold us accountable by monitoring implementation through periodic performance evaluation. This will enable all stakeholders to consistently play their key roles in ensuring safe education for all.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

For over a decade, Nigeria has witnessed the deliberate targeting of education, i.e., killings, abductions, and maiming of learners, teachers, non-teaching staff and destruction of educational facilities. Not less than 611 teachers have been killed, 19,000 teachers displaced, 910 schools damaged or destroyed, and more than 1,500 schools forced to close. An estimated 900,000 children have lost access to learning, while 75 per cent of children in IDP camps do not attend school. At the start of the school year in September 2021, at least one million children did not resume because families and communities were afraid of sending their children back to school due to the insecurity. This disruption to learning contributes to the high number of out-of-school children (OOSC) and increases the risk of children never stepping into a classroom again.

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The National Plan on Financing Safe Schools (2023-2026) is a concerted effort by the Federal Government to mobilise sustainable funding and the political will to provide a protected and safe learning environment for learners, teachers, and non-teaching staff.

The objectives are:

- Strengthen security resilience and integrate host communities in the protection of education
- Enhance the school community's capacity to protect education
- Create an effective and efficient national school security and emergency response infrastructure
- Enhance the capacity of security agencies to gather intelligence, prevent, and respond to attacks on education
- Provision of assistance to survivors of attacks on education

The Safe Schools Implementation Costed Plan interventions include 'kinetic measures', 'non-kinetic measures', 'security resilience in host and school communities' and 'policy advocacy, security assessment, monitoring and data collection'.

The Plan aims to cover 50% of the Most-At-Risk Public Schools over the medium-term (2023-2026). During the short-term, the plan will focus on enhancing Kinetic and non-Kinetic capabilities of responsive agencies and will run from the 1st guarter of 2023.

Implementation will commence in 2023 with the Very High-Risk States facing threats from Ansarul/ISWAP insurgents/terrorists, Boko Haram-inspired bandits, and armed bandits. These include: Borno, Yobe, Adamawa, Niger, Kaduna, Zamfara, Katsina, Kebbi, Jigawa, Sokoto, FCT, Plateau, Benue, Taraba, Kogi, and Bauchi.

This will be followed by the High-Risk states grappling with violent cult groups, ritualists, ethnic militias, separatist agitations, organised armed criminal groups, and illicit drug use in 2024. Such States include: Edo, Delta, Rivers, Cross River, Akwa Ibom, Ebonyi, Lagos, Enugu, Imo, Anambra, Abia, Osun, Oyo, Ondo, Ekiti, Bayelsa, Kwara, Gombe, and Kano.







This plan on financing safe schools in Nigeria, outlines a robust programme by Government, working in close collaboration with critical stakeholders, donors, development partners, and the various schools' host communities to mobilise resources and implement an action plan that would effectively provide a safer and more secured teaching and learning environment for its over 40 million school children and their teachers spread out across some 81, 545 schools nationwide. This intended action of government is in realisation that currently many children are out of school due to insecurity, and the fact that every child deserves a safe and secure learning environment. A recent report by UNICEF has shown that a total of 11, 536 schools had been closed between December 2020 and March 2022 due to insecurity, and that parents continue to withdraw their children from schools due to fear of insecurity. This plan, therefore, represents the determination by the Government of Nigeria to provide that safe and secure environment for all school children in every part of Nigeria.

History of school attacks in Nigeria

The Nigeria educational system has often been in deep crises on several fronts, including areas of access and quality of education. But the onset of the spate of school attacks and record mass kidnappings of school children arguably presented a grave existential threat to the nation's educational system.

The abduction of the Chibok school girls on 14th April 2014 seems to have set the pace for the numerous mass abductions of school children that have followed. The national and international uproar to this menace led to the launch of the Safe Schools Initiative (SSI) in Nigeria in May 2014. The initiative was launched with an investment from the Global Business Coalition for Education and matching contributions from the Federal Government of Nigeria, through the Federal Ministry of Finance Budget and National Planning, and the international donor community.

It is estimated that since the Boko Haram conflict erupted in 2009, 611 teachers have been killed, 19,000 teachers displaced, 910 schools damaged or destroyed, and more than 1,500 schools forced to close. An estimated 900,000 children have lost access to learning while 75 per cent of children in IDP camps do not attend school. Till date, several children abducted from several schools are still in captivity with their abductors.



Available data from the Global Coalition to Protect Education from Attack (GCPEA) flagship publication **Education** Attack 2022 reported that in the period 2020-2021:



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While violent attacks have been on the increase, the initial attention paid to the Safe Schools Initiative in 2014 after the Chibok incidence has waned due to lack of predictable financing.

The Challenge of Protecting Schools in Nigeria

There is an urgent need to ensure the security and safety of learners, teachers, and education personnel in their teaching, learning, and living environment. However, this is amidst a persistent challenge of keeping them safe and protecting educational assets in an environment with varying degrees of vulnerability and threats by:

Ansarul/ISWAP insurgents

Boko Haram terrorists

Armed bandits

Violent cult groups

Ritual killers

Ethnic militias

Separatist-agitation groups

Illicit drug use

Bullying

Child molestation and sexual assault

Abuse of corporal punishment, etc

1. The challenge with financing

One major challenge in achieving safe schools is the lack of deliberate funding policy or budgetary allocations. Putting immediate remediation measures in place for the myriad of security risks identified in the reported 62,271 unsecured schools would require significant expenditure. Such funding could be either by the Federal Government or the various sub-national governments for this purpose or via special funds to prosecute security measures in schools. To address this challenge, there must be sustainable funding from annual governmental budgetary provisions and regular support from development partners.



2. The response of government to safe schools in Nigeria

The response of government to the incessant attacks and abduction of students has mainly been to close such schools, particularly in high-risk areas. In 2014, as part of efforts



to tackle this menace, the Federal Government launched the Safe Schools Initiative (SSI), which was to enable children affected by conflict and insecurity to continue with their education unhindered. On 31st December 2019, President Muhammadu Buhari formally signed the Safe Schools Declaration Ratification Documents, signalling the country's commitment to its implementation in Nigeria. To further demonstrate the resolve of the government and people of Nigeria to address the serious challenges posed by conflicts and insecurity to safe schools, and in consultation with local and global stakeholders, the Honourable Minister for Finance, Budget and National Planning, Dr (Mrs) Zainab S. Ahmed convened a high-level forum in partnership with the EEC on Financing Safe Schools in Nigeria on 20th April, 2021, in Abuja. Also, between 25th and 27th October, 2021, Nigeria hosted the Fourth International Conference on the Safe Schools Declaration in Abuja. The summit primarily aimed to galvanise the needed support for the declaration and to review progress in achieving the various commitments to protect schools and children from further attacks. It was observed that one major challenge to achieving safe schools is lack of a deliberate funding policy or budgetary allocation either by the Federal Government or the various State governments for this purpose or special funds to prosecute security measures in schools.





Background

Following the huge negative impact of terrorism, armed conflict, banditry, and kidnapping on the Nigeria education sector, and the need to quickly stem the tide on a sustainable basis, the Honourable Minister of Finance, Budget and National Planning, Dr (Mrs) Zainab S. Ahmed, working closely with several national and international stakeholders and partners convened a one-day high level forum with a view to charting a new course towards ensuring sustainable financing for Safe Schools. The unprecedented forum which took place at the Transcorp Hilton Hotel, Abuja on Tuesday, 20th April, 2021 had the theme: 'Financing Safe Schools: Creating Safe Learning Communities'. The Forum had representatives from various ministries of the Federal Government of Nigeria, State Governments, the military and other security agencies, representatives of businesses, multilateral institutions and international donors, committed to developing and implementing an 'Abuja Financing Safe Schools Compact/Plan'. The Plan comprised a strategy for financing safe schools and a roadmap for implementing safe schools and places of learning.

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Stakeholders, i.e., national and sub national governments, heads of military and security agencies, the private sector, donors, and multilateral institutions, all pledged to collaboratively take a 'whole society' approach to create safer learning communities with a view to redressing the education emergency Nigeria is currently facing so that children can safely return to school. All stakeholders acknowledged that the number of out-ofschool children in Nigeria must be urgently addressed through sustainable policy action to avoid social and economic disaster.

Forum participants

The event was broadcast to a live audience across Nigeria. It also combined in-person and virtual participation, with 148 participants attending in person and over 2,000 globally joining virtually. Participants included State Governors, State Commissioners of Education,

members of the National Economic Council, members of the Federal Executive Council, members of the Legislature, the National Security Adviser and Service Chiefs, Captains of Industry, members of the Diplomatic Community, heads of multilateral institutions, donor organisations, Civil Society Organizations, and the media.

FRAMEWORK FOR BUILDING RESILIENCE AND COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

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Taking into cognisance the significant gap in physical security in and around schools and host communities, a near absence of rapid response infrastructure, and poor levels of security awareness among school administrators and other critical stakeholders, this national plan has incorporated a multi-level approach to providing responsive security coverage for host communities, schools, and other learning places.

- a. Development of a National School Security Rapid Response and Coordination Infrastructure
 This will focus on the protection of education within the framework of the Safe Schools
 Declaration and the *Guidelines*. To support rapid response and coordination, response centres
 will be provided by respective State Governments as their commitment while the Federal
 Government is responsible for equipping those centres.
- i. National School Security Response and Coordination Centre in Abuja
- ii. School Security Response Centres in the States
- iii. School Security Response Centres in the Local Government Areas

b. Building Resilience in School Communities

This will entail creating awareness and providing trainings on security, health, and safety for learners, teachers, non-teaching staff and SBMCs. This is to increase preparedness, and boost capacity and resilience at school level.

c. Supporting Security Resilience in Host Communities

This will entail building basic structures and processes within host communities and the development of critical capacities for effective detection, prevention, and response to attacks on education. It would also involve collaborating with other stakeholders, e.g., school communities, security and law enforcement agencies, government agencies, etc.

d. Strengthening the Competence and Capacity of Security and Law Enforcement Officers Deployed in Host Communities

It is necessary to improve the capacity of security and law enforcement personnel in schools so they can effectively perform their roles. Therefore, the National Plan has incorporated a robust training scheme for security personnel and vigilante groups which would focus on ensuring safe schools in Nigeria.

e. Regular Engagements and Policy Advocacy with the Nigerian Public and key Government Officials on Implementation of the National Plan


This will involve sensitising critical Nigerian public, stakeholders and government officials at all levels on the plan implementation, as well as on relevant activities and engagements.

Implementation Plan

The Safe Schools Implementation Costed Plan consists of integrated interventions that will be coordinated, monitored, and supervised by the FMFBNP including:





Security resilience in host and school communities



Non-Kinetic measures



Policy advocacy, security assessment, monitoring and data collection





An African adage notes: "It takes a whole village to train (and protect) a child". Therefore, the Plan would adopt the whole-of-society approach to securing schools and other learning environments. This entails all stakeholders working together. Members of school communities, SBMCs, host communities, security and law enforcement organisations, governments and governmental agencies, non-governmental organisations, businesses, philanthropists, donors and multilateral agencies—all must work together to achieve a safer and more secured teaching, learning, and living environment.

Projections

The Plan aims to cover 50% of the Most-At-Risk Public Schools over the medium term (2023-2026). Implementation will commence with the Very High-Risk States in 2023, while the implementation with the High-Risk states will follow in 2024.

Classification of risk coverage areas

VERY HIGH RISK STATES

Some states have been classified as very high-risk states based on the number and frequency of attacks, the sophistication of the attacks, the possibilities of more attacks, and the peculiarity of the security threats.

These threats include Ansarul/ISWAP insurgents/terrorists, Boko Haraminspired bandits, and armed bandits.

The affected states include Borno, Yobe, Adamawa, Niger, Kaduna, Zamfara, Katsina, Kebbi, Jigawa, Sokoto, FCT, Plateau, Benue, Taraba, Kogi and Bauchi.


The states considered as high-risk are so classified based on the types of threats and the number, frequency, and levels of attacks.

These states are Edo, Delta, Rivers, Cross River, Akwa Ibom, Ebonyi, Lagos, Enugu, Imo, Anambra, Abia, Osun, Oyo, Ondo, Ekiti, Bayelsa, Kwara, Gombe, and Kano.






